## Hui ā-Tau - Highlights from the AGM

A very successful AGM was held at Whakatū Marae at the end of April to hear and discuss the activities and progress of the Ngāti Tama entities over the past twelve months. Updates from the hui ā-tau include:



- All reports received were accepted as presented.
- The Vote to transfer commercial assets to Tama Asset Holding Company was passed (approved by 98% majority of all votes received).
- Honoraria payments for trustees will increase by 50% (approved by 88% majority of those in attendance).
- Congratulations to Butch Little, Leanne Manson and Andrew Stephens who were all re-elected unopposed as Trustees for a further three years.
- Acknowledgement of Ngāti Tama's leadership at the Kaumātua Christmas Lunch
- Appreciation for Ngāti Tama's assistance during the Nelson Fires emergency
- Request that a pouwhenua be erected in the place at Parapara where Te Puoho ki Te Rangi left his taiaha.
- No such thing as too much communication; please keep sharing information with iwi.

The most valuable thing I have gained in my role as an associate trustee at Ngati Tama has been the opportunity to build closer relationships with my whanaunga on the board. The manaakitanga, the mana, and the mātauranga around the table has welcomed me as whanaunga, filled me with pride to be Ngati Tama, and has opened the doors to vast knowledge and opportunities.

My studies in political science have given me a grounding in a tiny section of the kaupapa at the board table, but by and large every meeting has been a steep learning curve in another new direction. It has been fascinating to immerse myself in the structures, processes, and institutions that make up the Ngati Tama group, to learn about business finance, to get some insight into the demands on Ngāti Tama from businesses and councils, and perhaps most exciting for me, to get a glimpse of the potential Ngati Tama has to shape the future in Te Tau Ihu. It has been quite overwhelming to dive into all at once, but the manaaki from my whanaunga on the board has made it much easier to swallow. I am honoured to sit at the table and learn from such a powerful and knowledgeable group of people.

I'm currently living in Beachville in Nelson. My business card says "coffee specialist", I fix and maintain espresso machines, teach people to operate espresso machines, and pour the odd cup of coffee. I also pick up a bit of work building windows and doors out of recycled timber for my uncle Tony Billens at Norwest Demolition, and this year have dipped my toes into the world of Maori research with Tiakina te Taiao. Coffee guy/French door guy/kairangahau...'m not really comfortable giving out advice, but I think a value I picked up from my parents might answer your last couple of questions. Mum and Dad did a great job at showing me from an early age how much can be gained from exploiting every opportunity you are presented with.

The associate trustee position at Ngati Tama has not only been an awesome opportunity for me to learn within the trust, but it has opened doors to new opportunities in places I never saw coming. Most notably it opened the door to Cawthron Institute where I've picked up work for Tiakina te Taiao as a kairangahau. The associate position is a huge opportunity in the broadest sense, and I would encourage anyone considering it to contact myself or the trust to find out more.
